## ST. JOSEPH PATERNAL LEADER LISTING GUIDE

The willful placement of paternal leaders into our faith community is presented as an intentional effort to assist our pastors and priests with their laity. The goal of our paternal leaders is to become the innate resource for future generations of Catholics in navigating this chaotic world, while finding their way back to the faith.

Our deacons are our first line of interventionists who can step forward to fill these positions that will ultimately inspire other men of good will to follow in their lead. This effort is accomplished by adding a page to parish websites to offer bios, like Deacon Martin's below, which will serve well as a resource for our faith community to easily seek out someone who they might feel aligned with for spiritual guidance and ministerial assistance.

Our pastors are encouraged to inspire our lay congregation by personal invitation to fill this place of honor, in an effort to ignite the hearts of the fathers within their faith community that will ultimately ripple into our congregations as awareness grows. All laity candidates will first need to be properly formed to serve as paternal leaders, as proper alignment with Church teachings must be ensured. Each diocese can select and implement a Lay Ministry program to ready willing candidates. As this effort is carried through our congregations' lay ministries, the need will refine the process, as spiritual growth inevitably carries this effort forward.

This ministerial program is being placed into our faith community as a tool of reach, intended to become a resource that will innately be sought out by future generations of Catholics to help them in finding their way back to their Catholic faith. Our efforts will take hold of our children's will, and bear fruit, as our spiritual fathers intentionally share this awareness each St. Joseph Day as our children grow in their faith formation throughout their formative years. It will take the efforts of all fathers, spiritual and paternal alike, to lead well our future generations of Catholics, in measured out proper doses, to full understanding of the graces bestowed in the New Covenant teachings of the Mass and the Sacraments, especially the Eucharist. Placement of this tool can offer men of good will a proactive step toward changing the worldly narrative that is casting doubt on these objective truths.


Ex: Deacon Martin Ricart, St Thomas Aquinas, Charlotte, NC

- In order for intent to be established, and accountability of the conversation to be held, initial interaction should be hosted by phone, on Church grounds or in a public area.
- Each PL should maintain a log with date, time, location and a discretionary notation of spiritual advice and resources offered.
- All conversations are to be held in confidence and in adherence to the governing state laws (e.g., child protection laws, etc).
- Each interaction with an adult (men and women, 18 or older) seeking spiritual guidance should begin with prayer. The Fraternity of St. Joseph prayer, and the intent behind it, should be considered.
- Visit STACharlotte.com to view Deacon Martin PLL and resource documents.

NOTE: It is suggested that all paternal leaders consider consecration to St. Joseph as a first step in becoming a paternal leader.
